Project Eligibility/ Registration Criteria



Eligibility criteria for company specific projects (other than condemned essential gas appliance repair and replacement)

In order to qualify as a VCMA Project, a project must:

- a) have a positive, or a forecasted positive, Social Return on Investment (SROI) including for the gas consumers funding the VCMA Project;
- b) either:
 - i. provide support to consumers in Vulnerable Situations and relate to energy safeguarding, or
 - ii. provide awareness of the dangers of CO, or
 - iii. reduce the risk of harm caused by CO;
- c) have defined outcomes and the associated actions to achieve these;
- d) go beyond activities that are funded through other price control mechanism(s) or required through licence obligations; and
- e) not be delivered through other external funding sources directly accessed by a GDN, including through other government (national, devolved or local) funding.¹

Eligibility criteria for company specific essential gas appliance servicing, repair, and replacement

In order to qualify as a VCMA Project, unsafe pipework and essential gas appliance² servicing, repair or replacement must meet the following criteria:

- a) a GDN has to isolate and condemn unsafe pipework or an an essential gas appliance following a supply interruption or as part of its emergency service role;
- b) the household cannot afford to service, repair or replace unsafe pipework or the essential gas appliance; and
- c) sufficient funding is not available from other sources (including national, devolved or local government funding) to fund the unsafe pipework or the essential gas appliance servicing, repair or replacement.

² Essential gas appliances are gas fuelled heating systems (including gas boilers and gas fires), and gas cookers.





¹ If part, but not full, funding is available through an external funding source for an eligible project, VCMA funding can be used for the remaining amount.

Problem(s)	The Charity National Energy Action predicts that around 4 million homes in the UK were already classed as fuel poor before a surge in global energy market prices triggered one of the steepest energy bill hikes in October 2021. Campaigners are braced for a record increase in the numbers of people unable to pay their energy bills following another hike this spring. "Those on lowest incomes and in less-efficient homes will not just face financial hardship but intolerable living conditions, ill health and, for too many, a shortened life," Adam Scorer, chief executive of National Energy Action. Pembrokeshire FRAME is a supported employment and life changing charity that transforms hundreds of lives in Pembrokeshire each year, by providing access to learning, supported and meaningful occupation, social enterprise, voluntary and employment opportunities, help and support to enable individuals to reach their potential. Many people come to Pembrokeshire FRAME having been turned away from support elsewhere. They battle with all kinds of issues such as disabilities, learning difficulties, breakdowns, poverty, mental health, illness, loneliness, lack of confidence and low self-esteem. In addition to Pembrokeshire FRAME's existing work, they are keen to holistically support their communities and one of their priorities is to provide support to ensure their health and safety and ability to lead independent lives. There is a need to support their participants, volunteers, staff, and local community through this predicted difficult time and also to provide awareness programmes about the dangers of carbon monoxide in their homes.

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- As part of this project Pembrokeshire FRAME are requesting funding for a Community Fuel Co-ordinator who will develop and deliver a 2-year project focused on the following objectives:
- Raising awareness about energy efficiency and tackling fuel poverty
- Acting as a community point of contact for those with fuel poverty issues offering information and signposting for assistance with unclaimed benefits, tariff comparisons etc
- Supporting people to decarbonise their home heating, offering guidance and signposting
- Delivering workshops, talks and activity events in our Green Shed Community Reuse Centre
- Exploring the potential to work with local school groups across Pembrokeshire and with our local Pembrokeshire College based in Merlin's Bridge
- Exploring the potential, then following up and working with local community groups such as Norman Industries, Mind, Sandy Bears, Pembrokeshire People First, to invite groups to attend our sessions or for our Co-ordinator to deliver outreach sessions
- To raise awareness about the dangers of carbon monoxide
- To be a point of distribution for free CO monitors whereby we can identify individuals most in need of these
- To support our vulnerable participants, volunteers, staff and vulnerable members of the community with locking cooker valves and any other appropriate safety assistance and advice that we can provide
- Development of literature, booklets and online content including videos and online workshops to support our awareness raising project
- To recruit and train a team of Community Fuel Champions to provide fuel poverty related support to the local community making this a sustainable and ongoing project

UPDATE-November 2024

The community fuel co-ordinator will continue to deliver the services as outlines above over a 22-month period for 4.5 days per week.

Why the Project is being funded through the VCMA, and how this aligns to GDN's VCMA Strategy	In addition, a community fuel co-ordinator assistant will be resourced to support the co-ordinator with the delivery and reporting of the project for 2 days a week. Over the 22-month delivery period, Frame expect to reach 3000 individuals directly, with the support services outlined above, and evidence financial savings of £19,352.00. Wales & West Utilities does not own or bill customers for their gas consumption, however, through stakeholder engagement, we recognise our role in making sure gas is used safely, and efficiently. This project goes above and beyond our core responsibilities as a Gas Distribution Network, and is eligible under the VCMA funding criteria as it will provide energy efficiency advice and CO safety advice/interventions, empowering each householder to use energy safely, efficiently, and affordably. Evidence of Stakeholder/ Customer support	This project aligns to strategic pillar one. Through our business planning for RIIO GD2, priority customers research and stakeholders told us that tackling fuel poverty was a priority for WWU, alongside raising awareness of the PSR and the dangers of CO. In our business plan we laid out a proposed spend for the first year of RIIO GD2 of £200k towards tackling fuel poverty, out of an assumed pot of £750k. In the final determinations, the VCMA allowance for WWU was doubled to £1.4m with 75% to be spent on projects within the WWU area. Our continued engagement with stakeholders such as the NEA, Citizens Advice, and charities supported by fuel poverty statistics shows due
	to high inflation and record energy prices that fuel poverty is impacting more homes than
